Those Who Vanish

Patricia Grace King

Winner of the 2026 Drue Heinz Literature Prize

Summary

Taking place during the decades-long civil conflict, *Those Who Vanish* follows the stories of Guatemalan citizens and North American expats set on a collision course by war. Martyrs and missionaries, guerrillas and gringos are thrown together amid political violence. A peace worker shelters a rebel fighter. An exile returns to confront the legacy of her parents' murders. The Virgin Mary begins appearing above an elderly woman's stove. Set in a world of daily disappearances, the collection addresses a vital question: When all certainties are snatched away, what remains of lives, of memory, of faith?

Patricia Grace King grew up in North Carolina and has since lived in Spain, Guatemala, and the United Kingdom, where she resides. Her short fiction has won the Miami University Novella Prize, the *Arts & Letters* Fiction Prize, and the *Florida Review's* Leiby Prize. Other stories have been published by *Ploughshares*, *The Gettysburg Review*, *Narrative*, and *Nimrod*. A former Carol Houck Smith Fellow at the University of Wisconsin, she has received additional support from the Sewanee Writers' Conference, the Vermont Studio Center, and the British Library. *Those Who Vanish* is her first book.

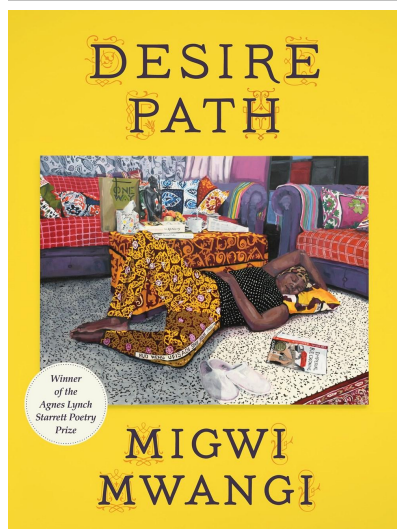

Desire Path explores how everyday life, memory, history, and politics work against and toward each other across communities and national boundaries. 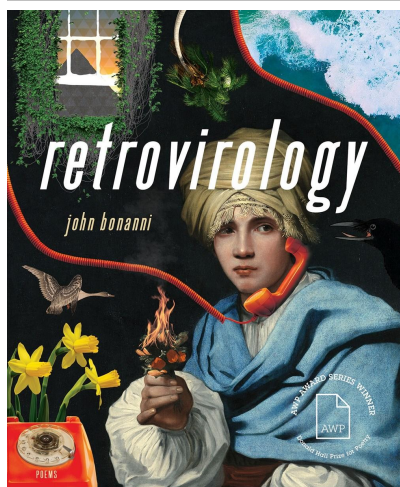

Poems that Draw from Queer Lineage to Unleash the Wisdom of AIDS Activism into Our Current Political Moment

Summary

Winner of the 2025 Donald Hall Prize for Poetry

retrovirology oscillates between Queer childhood erasure and the AIDS epidemic, pulling from the ACT UP oral history project, informal interviews with survivors, and AIDS historians Sarah Schulman and David France. While some poems elegize key figures of AIDS history such as Larry Kramer and Gaëton Dugas, others operate as ekphrasis against the creative artwork of ACT UP's direct actions. Combining reinterpretations of formal elements such as the concrete poem, the abecedarian, and the villanelle, post-confessional poems converse with a docupoetic history through an arc that examines what it meant to grow up Queer as a child in rural Pennsylvania in the late '80s and early '90s, surrounded by messages of gay disease and the violence of its silences. *retrovirology*, then, resurrects Queer elders to allow memory to "rise from its subjugated state" (Jung) and to carry with it, into our futures, all of its wisdom and fire.

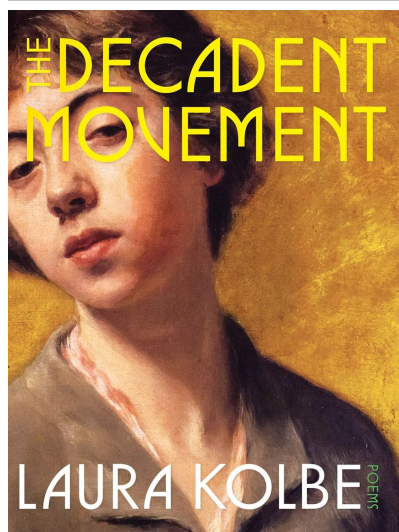

The Decadent Movement

Poems

Laura Kolbe

A Reverse-Diary in Poems that Chronicles the First Year of Motherhood and Nine Months of Pregnancy, from End to Beginning

Summary

The Decadent Movement is a book-length suite of poems that spins backward in time through the early days of parenthood and the preceding nine months of pregnancy. Beginning a year after childbirth in the harried throes of marriage and parenting, the collection proceeds toward its finale "Minus Time," which marvels at death's near-identical twin – that infinite period of nonexistence that precedes each new life. From the opening poem "Afterword," each dated poem slides backward in time, with the poem "Hinge" at the manuscript's midpoint spoken from the moment of childbirth.

This unraveling of a predicament by playing it in reverse – "Muybridged / out so anyone could see, framed, a woman / running for her life" – allows for rigorously honest accounting of mixed feelings about motherhood and its accompanying physical and psychic changes, detached from the readymade tropes of the "pregnancy plot."

The Decadent Movement is a book about the fear of loss (of sexual personhood, bodily self-determination, the ability to write, and the license to be headlong and volatile). Yet it is also about the need to insist on new terms of engagement with those we love, new languages of willfulness and desire.

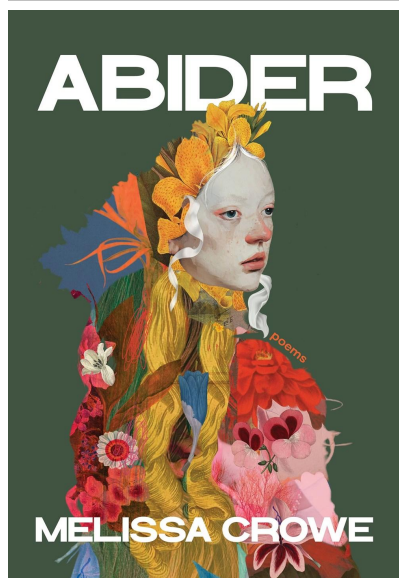

A Memoir in Verse that Follows a Semi-Feral Girlchild-Turned-Wife Through Her Queer Awakening Toward Sovereignty

Summary

Equal parts sad, sexy, and searching, *Abider* opens with the central lament/brag of its lover-speaker, that she can never truly leave anything—or anyone—behind. The origins of this abidingness are traced in odes and elegies for a rural girlhood beset with jeopardy and scarcity and neglect. But it was also good-wild, conducive to a reckless freedom she can't help grieving, even as she falls in love at sixteen and marries hard. Meanwhile, other, electric connections are painfully delimited by heteronormative expectations, and her growing dis-ease reveals that she has been trying (and failing) to heal by remaining where she is harmed. She wants—this harrowed, semi-feral girl turned unswerving woman—to stay and go at once, and the tension between her desire for connection and her wish to escape threatens her sense of self and animates these vivid, urgent, tenderhearted poems. Right on time, then, a secret third thing emerges: a final, lush and lucid sonnet sequence that culminates in a promise to abide—first, foremost, always—the self.

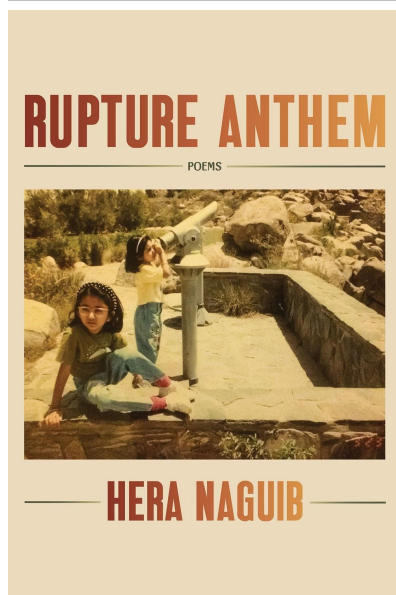

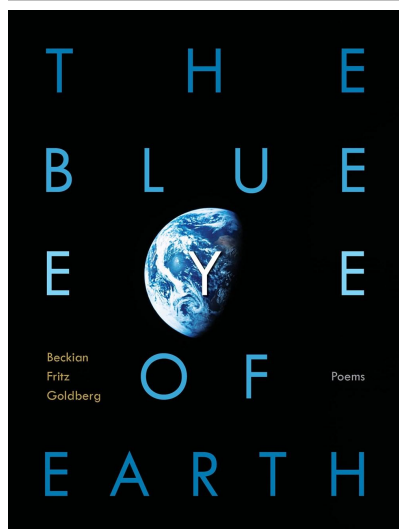

Summary

In her first collection in a decade, Beckian Fritz Goldberg returns with *The Blue Eye of Earth*, her tour de force of luminous, meditative poems that measure a secret distance between person and cosmos, memory and desire, beauty and grief. 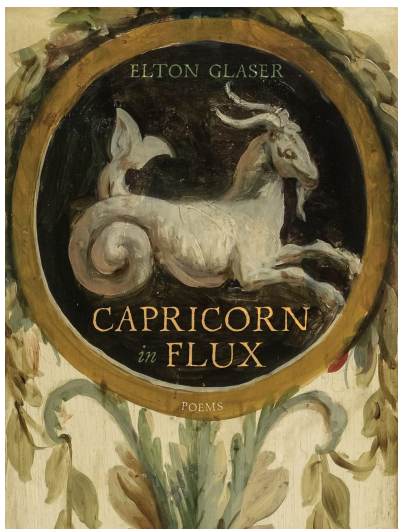

Capricorn in Flux

Elton Glaser

Navigates the Indignities and Exuberance of the Fading Years

Summary

Throughout *Capricorn in Flux*, Glaser's eleventh book of poetry, we hear that same voice, vivid and precise and crackling with verve and wit. To borrow a line from Robert Lowell, he is still "free-lancing out along the razor's edge." But this time, the sprightliness is shadowed by a darker perspective. Now in his early eighties, Glaser takes into account the diminishments and indignities of late age. Though he calls himself "Laureate of the bent vernacular and the slippery joke," he also cannot help but feel the encroachments of the concluding years: "The nervous pressure of what's next." Harboring what comforts are left—the arts, a new love, the cycle of the seasons—Glaser finds the resilience he needs as everything else fades away, that last flare of grace and energy, ever restless and exuberant: "The mind buried alive in the body."

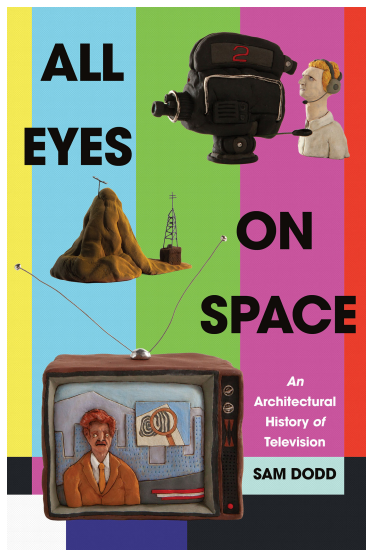

All Eyes on Space

An Architectural History of Television

Sam Dodd

Reveals Television as the Architecture of America's Spatial Imagination

Summary

In *All Eyes on Space*, Sam Dodd looks at television and sees architecture: a dynamic system of spatial design, environmental planning, and bodily control operating behind and beyond the small screen. By transmitting images and sounds across vast distances, television brings faraway places into immediate view and, in the process, reshapes how space is imagined and inhabited. Yet, this seemingly effortless presentation of "distant sight" is only possible because of deliberate architectural investments made throughout the second half of the twentieth century. From the 1940s onward, American architects and planners designed stations, studios, towers, cables, and screens while also experimenting with television as a medium for public communication and engagement. Drawing on archival records, original broadcasts, and works of art and design, Dodd plots a history of television architecture in the United States to show how the medium produced a distinctly American spatial logic that tethered expansionist ambitions to the management of visibility and access. Ultimately, this book reveals how a ubiquitous medium commonly understood as immaterial—if not ephemeral—became one of the century's most consequential built environments.

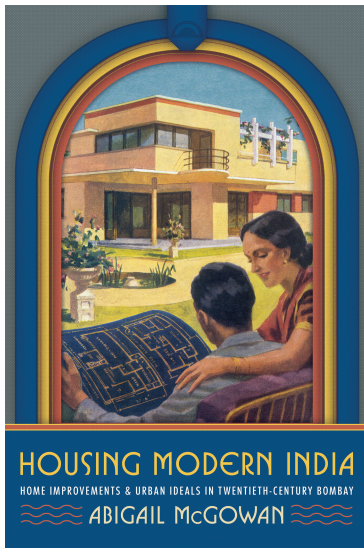

Trade flowed across Eurasia, around the Indian Ocean, and over the Mediterranean for millennia, but in the early modern period, larger parts of the globe became connected through these established trade routes. Knowledge, embodied in various people, materials, texts, objects, and practices, also moved and came together along these routes in hubs of exchange where different social and cultural groups intersected and interacted.

Entangled Itineraries traces this movement of knowledge across the Eurasian continent from the early years of the Common Era to the nineteenth century, following local goods, techniques, tools, and writings as they traveled and transformed into new material and intellectual objects and ways of knowing. Focusing on nonlinear trajectories of knowledge in motion, this volume follows itineraries that weaved in and out of busy, crowded cosmopolitan cities in China; in the trade hubs of Kucha and Malacca; and in centers of Arabic scholarship, such as Rey and Baghdad, which resonated in Bursa, Assam, and even as far as southern France. Contributors explore the many ways in which materials, practices, and knowledge systems were transformed and codified as they converged, swelled, at times disappeared, and often reemerged anew.

Rhetoric has long had a contentious relationship with the idea of truth, and the field of contemporary rhetorical studies has often been skeptical of easy understandings of truth. Meanwhile, hostility to truth is doing a lot of real-world damage, even if truth itself may never have been completely reliable. The idea of post-truth poses systemic problems for rhetoric's traditional concerns. Active obfuscation, negation of truth, and even truth-indifference are certainly not new. But the past couple of decades have seen a proliferation and pervasiveness of falsities, rendering the term "post-truth" an identifiable marker of the contemporary moment. Public life regularly provides examples of both post-truth in action and efforts to combat it by invoking truth. In *Rhetoric Before and Beyond Post-Truth*, a range of English, communications, philosophy, and political science scholars draw on the resources of rhetoric to understand this moment, how truth has functioned in the past, and how it may continue to function when it is no longer accepted.

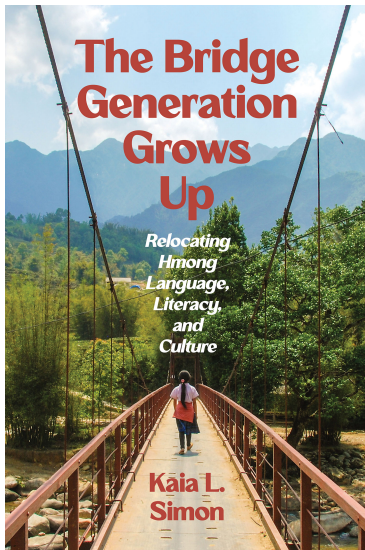

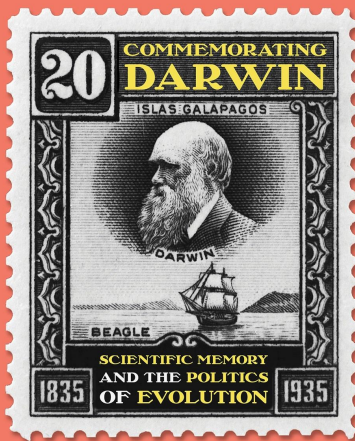

Mass Media and the Forging of a New Astronomy, 1860-1910

In the autumn of 1909, as the planet Mars swung away from its closest approach to Earth in seventeen years, two astronomers got into a fight. It was over the control of news from Mars. Both men were senior figures in their field, and both wanted the exact same thing: to secure for their own observatories exclusive control over the distribution of telegraphic bulletins reporting breaking astronomical news. With victory in this battle came the

to collect observers' reports, adjudicate what counted as newsworthy, and then broadcast this selected information around the world, transmitting it to all subscribing observatories and news agencies, sometimes within hours of its receipt. Since 1882 Harvard College Observatory had performed this task in North America, partnering with the Royal Observatory in Kiel, Germany, to collect and rapidly redistribute announcements of planetary, asteroid, satellite, and nova discoveries. But after a quarter century of uninterrupted broadcasts, Harvard College Observatory's director, Edward Charles Pickering, found himself and his institution facing down a coup. Two and a half thousand miles away, high on the desolate Colorado Plateau, Percival Lowell plotted a takeover.

At the heart of this battle was a disagreement over a single fundamental question: was there evidence of life on Mars? Lowell thought that the answer was yes, and in 1894 he had built a state-of-the-art observatory in Flagstaff, Arizona, with the express intention of proving it. Pickering disagreed, and his frustration with Lowell's bold claims about intelligent Martian life was soon exacerbated by their growing popular appeal.

Lowell's success, Pickering realized, was predicated in part on his rival's access to Harvard Observatory's bulletin service, which simultaneously linked the Flagstaff astronomer to his colleagues and to the world's mass media. So Pickering wrote to Lowell to inform him of a change of service: Harvard Observatory would no

Summary

Mass media in the late nineteenth century was full of news from Mars. In the wake of Giovanni Schiaparelli's 1877 discovery of enigmatic dark, straight lines on the red planet, astronomers and the public at large vigorously debated the possibility that it might be inhabited. As rivalling scientific practitioners looked to marshal allies and sway public opinion—through newspapers, periodicals, popular books, exhibitions, and encyclopedias—they exposed disagreements over how the discipline of astronomy should be organized and how it should establish acceptable conventions of discourse. *News from Mars* provides a new account of this extraordinary episode in the history of astronomy, revealing how major transformations in astronomical practice across Britain and America were inextricably tied up with popular scientific culture and a transatlantic news economy that enabled knowledge to travel. 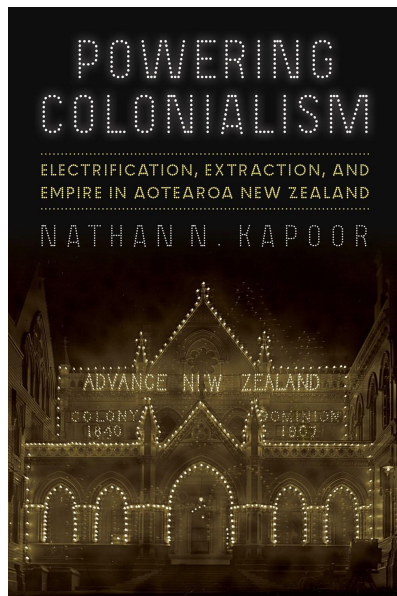

Summary

Powering Colonialism explores the history of electrification and its relationship to colonialism in Aotearoa New Zealand. Exploitative electric infrastructure, Nathan N. Kapoor argues, was not inevitable, and it was not determined by geography or a coincidence of colonization—it was by design. By the twenty-first century, hydropower provided more than half the country's electricity. Although it is now lauded as a renewable energy source, advocates for the earliest hydroelectrification schemes were more concerned with extracting greater profits and highlighting British technological superiority. Settlers, miners, and politicians saw electricity as a tool for achieving modernity, wealth, and self-sufficiency, and Aotearoa New Zealand's vast river system, once a barrier to colonial expansion, was now used to justify it. The electrification projects Kapoor examines in *Powering Colonialism*—from hydroelectric power for gold mining in the 1880s to Māori-led geothermal energy plants in use today—illustrate how, from the very beginning of Aotearoa New Zealand's transition to electric power, settlers designed and used electric power systems in service to their colonial mission.

Each chapter captures and interrogates the agency of different actors, including the Italian and Belgian states, the coal industry, medical experts, miners, and the ecologies that develop in polluted areas left by the coal industry. *Italian Lives, Belgian Coal* tells a sobering story of the environmental and corporeal injustice wielded by capitalist institutions and its impact on health and medical science, society, and nature.

Rosario Murillo and the Fate of Nicaragua

Karen Kampwirth

A Critical Biography of the Nicaraguan Political Figure Rosario Murillo

Murillo has been first lady of Nicaragua twice (1985–1990 and 2007–2017), vice president (2017–2025), and copresident (since February 2025). She also is a published poet who has been involved in Sandinista politics since the late 1960s.
